

Financial highlights for the year ended 31 March 2009







Above Bangor Marina on the south shore of Belfast Lough, close to the Irish Sea cruising routes. The marina has become well known since it opened for providing a safe berth in the centre of Bangor, a highly attractive town with many places to visit.

Below SeaGen tidal energy project in Strangford Lough, where Marine Current Turbines have a non-commercial lease from The Crown Estate. The 1.2MW turbine feeds enough power into the Northern Ireland grid for 1.000 homes.

- Revenue from The Crown Estate in Northern Ireland was £1.0 million, an increase of £300,000, over same period last year

- Marine Current Turbines has a noncommercial lease with The Crown Estate to enable the company to progress a tidal energy scheme in Strangford Lough. The 1.2MW SeaGen project was commissioned during the summer of 2008 and provides renewable energy for around 1,000 homes.
- Significant areas of activity for The Crown Estate in Northern Ireland include marinas at Bangor and Carrickfergus, leases for port facilities at Londonderry and Larne Harbour; regulating leases to various local authorities across the region along with cables and gas pipelines.
- Across the region there are a number of conservation leases to the National Trust, The Environment and Heritage Service for Northern Ireland and the RSPB.
- A number of leases for sporting rights are managed through the Joint Group for Wildfowling and Conservation on tidal land which includes a representative from The Environment and Heritage Service for Northern Ireland.
- The Crown Estate is involved in granting leases to a number of shellfish operators, mainly in Strangford and Belfast in close co-operation with the Department for Agriculture and Rural Development.
- Throughout Northern Ireland The Crown Estate has 27 current licences to companies for mineral exploration. Northern Ireland's only gold mine is at Omagh. A gold and silver extraction agreement was issued to Omagh Minerals Limited in 1993, the company has been operational on the site since 2006.
